ABC's of Financial Freedom - Choice

Week 3- Discussion Guide

Icebreaker

If you suddenly received an unexpected \$10,000 today, what would you do with it? Why?

Read

Take turns reading 2 Corinthians 9:6-11

Discuss

The passage begins by comparing giving to a farmer planting seeds - plant a few seeds, get a small crop; plant generously, get a generous crop (v. 6).

• How have you seen this principle of "sowing and reaping" play out in your own life both financially and even in other areas such as relationships?

A giving and cheerful attitude is more important than the actual amount given (v. 7). If you can only give a small amount you shouldn't be embarrassed. God is concerned about how you give from your resources (Mark 12:41-44).

- Do you have a difficult time letting go of your money?
- Why do you think it's so important that giving comes from a personal decision and a cheerful heart, rather than reluctantly or under pressure?

Sometimes we worry about giving generously to God because we worry that we will not have enough to live on. Paul assures us in verses 8-11 that God will provide all that we need with plenty to share if we are giving with a cheerful heart. He blesses us to be a blessing.

- What is the difference between God providing "all you need" and "all you want"?
- Where do you see yourself clinging to financial security instead of trusting God's provision?
- What are some practical ways you could begin shifting more of your financial "investments" toward things with eternal impact?

Application

We need to move from just talking about generosity to actually practicing it. We need to make the choice to honor God with what He has given us.

- What might it look like to give in a way that requires faith, not just comfort?
- What's one step of generosity you could take this week that would stretch your faith and not just fit into your comfort zone?

Prayer

Spend time in prayer thanking God for His provision in your life and asking Him to help you move from simply talking about generosity to actively practicing it.
